Message from AAFI-AFICS Geneva

Founding Member 26 July 1975

"The Association of Former International Civil Servants (AAFI-AFICS), Geneva, had its beginnings in 1940 as the Amicale des anciens fonctionnaires du BIT, (ILO Retiree Association). A sister association of former officials of the League of Nations subsequently merged with the Amicale thereby becoming the first association of former international civil servants. In 1955 the Amicale transformed itself into the Association of Former International Civil Servants (AAFI-AFICS) and opened its membership to retirees from the United Nations Secretariat, other organs within the United Nations, and the Specialized Agencies. Subsequently other associations were formed in New York, Paris and Rome. These associations decided in 1975 to found the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS)."



The creation of the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS) fifty years ago marked a pivotal milestone for retirees of the United Nations system. It responded to a fundamental need: to speak with one voice in order to defend the rights and interests of former staff members and to obtain full recognition of their role as key stakeholders in the sound functioning of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund (UNJSPF). It also played a crucial role in safeguarding an appropriate and solidarity-based health insurance system.

Thanks to the tireless work and ongoing commitment of successive presidents, FAFICS has gradually established itself as a responsible, competent, and fully recognized entity. Its vigilant and sustained action notably prevented the transfer of health insurance funding solely to the retirees' countries of residence — a measure that would have weakened their social protection.

Today, even though the financial situation of the Pension Fund appears stable, it would be unwise to lower our guard. FAFICS continues to play a key role by maintaining active oversight and intervening, when necessary, with the governing bodies of the Fund and the Joint Committee. It has firmly defended the preservation of the dual-track system and continues to advocate for its reinstatement whenever new conditions allow. Similarly, the issue of increasing small pensions remains a top priority, pursued with determination.

FAFICS' expertise, credibility, and relevance of its contributions have made it an indispensable, respected, and trusted partner for all concerned bodies. Through its committed representatives, it embodies a strong, coherent, and effective voice in defending the rights of international retirees.

The celebration of this 50th anniversary is a living testament to the values that FAFICS has consistently promoted: solidarity, equity, commitment, and responsibility. These values remain today, more than ever, the foundation of its actions and the guarantee of its relevance in the decades to come.

THE COUNCIL AND ITS OFFICERS

The Federation is governed by the Council, on which all member associations are represented. The Council meets annually. The executive body of the Federation, its Bureau, is composed of Associations members who are elected by the Council to serve two-year renewable terms as volunteers. The Federation's seat is in Geneva, Switzerland. Bureau members come from Associations around the world.

HOW WE SERVE

We support and promote the purposes, principles, programmes, and achievements of the United Nations system. In particular, we

- represent the entire community of former international civil servants on appropriate organs of the United Nations system, in particular vis-à-vis the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund (UNJSPF);
- maintain and develop solidarity and close contact among Member Associations and support their activities, as well as promoting coordination with federations of staff members in service;
- inform Member Associations about matters of interest, such as pensions, benefits, and after-service health insurance and long-term care, including, through the experiences of its respective members, knowledgeable sources of information and advice on other aspects of life in countries around the world that impact the lives of retirees.

FAFICS encourages all retirees of the United Nations system, especially its specialized agencies, funds, programmes, and entities to join any of the existing member associations. Many of these associations also organize pre-retirement seminars for active staff nearing their retirement to consider joining an association of retirees.

For these activities, we maintain a pool of expertise drawn from our member associations to ensure succession planning within the Federation.

WHOM WE PARTNER WITH

FAFICS is a non-governmental organization accredited to and in consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), the Human Rights Council (HRC), and the United Nations Department of Global Communications. In these capacities, FAFICS participates in ECOSOC and HRC meetings and their subsidiary bodies. We also work closely with the United Nations Department of Global Communications. FAFICS also participates in civic forums and other advocacy events in support of the purposes, principles, programmes, and achievements of the United Nations system, where the contributions, experience, and views of former international civil servants may be useful. It also maintains consultative status with the Federation of International Civil Servants' Associations (FICSA).

WHOM WE REPRESENT

Our advocacy activities are on behalf of the world-wide retirees from United Nations system organizations. As of the 53rd session of the Council held in Vienna on 17-20 July 2023, FAFICS has a total membership of 64 associations representing over 18,000 members located in all regions of the world, whom we represent directly.

WHOM WE WORK WITH



United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund

FAFICS is the official representative of beneficiaries of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund and, as such, attends the meetings of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Board (UNJSPB). FAFICS representatives participate actively and effectively in the sessions of the Pension Board and its Committees, and in all working groups established by the Pension Board. FAFICS maintains close contact with the Chief Executive for Pension Administration (CEPA) and the Representative of the Secretary-General for Investments (RSG) and relevant staff in their offices.

FAFICS is constantly engaged in activities to improve and protect the interests of beneficiaries of the UNJSPF. Through its Standing Committee on Pension Issues, the FAFICS Council monitors the Pension Adjustment system and cost-of-living adjustment mechanisms and seeks improvements where this may be necessary. FAFICS supports initiatives to ensure coverage of pension benefits for various categories of members, including divorced spouses and non-traditional partners, as well as the delegation of authority for members who may be incapacitated. FAFICS works closely with UNJSPF to ensure expeditious payment of pension benefits to United Nations system retirees in countries in crisis or those experiencing challenging situations.

After-Service Health Insurance and Long-term Care

Through the Standing Committee on After-Service Health Insurance and Long-Term Care (ASHIL), FAFICS engages in the exchange and comparison of information to improve the consistency of health insurance coverage. It also promotes health-insurance best practices across organizations of the United Nations system. The ASHIL Standing Committee also participates as an observer in inter-agency meetings of human-resource officers on long-term care benefits. The Federation's aim is to have these benefits incorporated into all organizational health-insurance plans.

Other Associations

Other groups representing both former international and national staff of the United Nations system may apply for membership in FAFICS and, if qualified, will have their applications reviewed during Council deliberations. Application procedures for FAFICS membership are available on the website. Prospective associations must have at least 25 members to qualify for FAFICS membership.







History of FAFICS

Established in 1975, the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS) brings together 65 Member Associations worldwide, representing approximately 22,000 retirees and beneficiaries around the world, from the United Nations and its specialized agencies, on issues related to pensions and after service health insurance, including long term care.

FAFICS operates as a non-profit association, governed by the FAFICS Council, and its Bureau. It is accredited by the UN Economic and Social Commission (ECOSOC). It has its principal office at the Villa Bocage, Palais des Nations, Geneva, although its Bureau officers are spread out in different parts of the world. Its Council meets every year.

The inaugural FAFICS Council Session was held in Geneva on 26 July 1975.



The goals of FAFICS have been and continue to be the support and promotion of the UN Charter, being the 'spark' to help local Associations of retired staff from UN system organizations form and solve local issues, and of course to work with other parties to maintain and improve fair and just pensions and health insurance.

FAFICS celebrates 50 years this year, 2025. Throughout these years, FAFICS has been the unwavering voice of UN retirees, championing their rights, well-being, and continued engagement with the global UN community. More than just an advocacy body, FAFICS embodies the principles of solidarity, service, and lifelong commitment to the ideals of the United Nations.

The transition from active service to retirement does not mean disengagement from the UN's mission. Through its network of national associations, FAFICS ensures that retirees remain connected, informed, and empowered. It plays a vital role in safeguarding pensions, medical benefits, and social protections, advocating at the highest levels—from the UN General Assembly to the UNJSPF and beyond.

Yet, FAFICS' value goes far beyond policy advocacy. It fosters a sense of belonging, allowing retirees to stay involved, mentor younger generations, and contribute their vast expertise to global and local causes. In a rapidly changing world, FAFICS provides stability, continuity, and a trusted platform for retirees to collectively address challenges and opportunities.

As FAFICS marks its milestone golden year, it reaffirms a simple yet powerful truth: retirement is not the end of service, it is a new phase of contribution, and FAFICS ensures that no UN retiree walks this journey alone.



The beginnings of FFOA and its role in FAFICS History

The Former FAO and Other UN Staff Association (FFOA)

Recognizing the need to remain linked to the UN and to protect common interests of the increasing number of their retirees, a number of associations were established starting in the '70s. FFOA (The Former FAO and Other UN Staff Associations) was created in 1971 after having received the blessing of the then Director General, Addekke Hendrik Boerma of FAO. The first member was enrolled in May 1971; FOA has had eight Presidents since its foundation notably Anton Doeve, Alan Prien and Edward Seidler (present). All have been keen supporters of FAFICS and value its activities in representing the interest of the global UN retiree community.

At the time of its creation, the only retirees in Rome came from FAO and WFP; subsequently retirees from IFAD and from other UN Organizations who had settled in Rome joined the Association. From the '70s FFOA has been hosted by FAO. In 1984, FFOA was officially incorporated in FAO through the Recognition Agreement signed by the then Director General, Edouard Saouma on 30 December 1994. Subsequently, Recognition Agreements were also signed on 15 May 2003 by Lennart Båge, President of IFAD and on 31 May 2004 by James Morris, Executive Director, WFP.

FFOA started with 140 members, mostly resident in Italy. After 15 years the Association had grown to approximately 1,000 members located in 71 countries. By year 2000 membership had more than doubled, and today. FFOA has 2,300 members, representing 100 nationalities resident in 80 countries.

During its first 50 years of activity, FFOA contributed to the following key events:

 The creation in 1975 of the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS) with Headquarters in Geneva together with Associations in New York, Paris and Geneva. Anton Doeve of FAO was one the founding fathers of FAFICS and as FFOA President

- was one of the leaders who had the vision of creating the Federation that today links many UN retirees local associations around the world.
- The establishment of sound policies for managing the UNJSPF and enhancing its operations
- The approval of methodologies for setting and adjusting conditions of employment of UN staff at all levels, with particular reference to pensionable remuneration and pension benefits
- The implementation of appropriate measures to eliminate the sizeable actuarial imbalance that had been accrued in the Pension Fund
- The establishment of a revised pension adjustment system based on single (US dollar) or double (US dollar and local currency) tracks
- The change from a free to a fee-paying after service medical coverage in FAO, WFP, IFAD and ICCROM, based on fair cost-sharing principles and procedures agreed to by the parties concerned, and
- The agreement with FAO, IFAD and WFP that building passes be issued to pensioners and recognized by the three Agencies.

Over the years Anton was leading the way for the growth of both FFOA and FAFICS. Many UN retirees who participated in the work of FAFICS in the past will remember how the federation was kept away from main activities of the UN Pension Board and very seldom allowed to enter the Board meeting rooms and how it had to beg for the floor only on specific matters of direct relevance for retirees. As many of you know, UN retirees don't have the right to vote and in the early years this was interpreted as excluding FAFICS from the main Pension Board debates even those regarding their benefits and rights. Nowadays FAFICS is a full-fledged player in all meetings and specialized committees of the Pension Board. Its contribution to the progress of the Board is widely recognized as competent, technically sound, relevant and effective.

Many of FFOA's members together with colleagues from other Member Associations, contributed to this remarkable progress. Together with Anton Doeve, one should also recall the precious contributions of Aurelio Marcucci and Alan Prien, who were key players in the progress of FAFICS as Vice Presidents. Marco Breschi of FFOA was recently President of FAFICS for two terms and played a key role in with other to improve the operations, transparency and effectiveness of FAFFICS. Many other FFOA colleagues have contributed to the work of FAFICS. Together with our current President Edward Seidler, they continue the tradition of providing unbiased effective support to the work of the FAFICS delegates to the Pension Board. This included coping with attempts by unfriendly sources to diminish the relevance and influence of the Federation. Fortunately, these attempts were identified at an early stage and neutralized.

At this juncture, FAFICS is confronted with the need to enhance its role to a more political level, having in mind its future. In a world where multilateralism is challenged all the time and international institutions are put under stress by autocratic forces around the world, it is im-

portant that FAFICS maintain effective communication with its stakeholders, its partners, Member Nations and UN organizations. Recent financial turmoil within the UN system and cutbacks in funding of essential activities will put pressure to reduce expenditures and could threaten staff and retiree hard earned rights and any proposed cuts must be vigorously defended. Communication must be at the forefront not only outside the Federation but also quite importantly inside. Efforts should be continued to expand FAFICS membership both in terms of the number of member associations as well as the number of individuals associated within each association. More direct, in person contact between member associations should be in the immediate horizon of FAFICS. With its remarkable past initiatives and its impact on the administration of pension benefits and rights, FAFICS is uniquely placed to remain the leading force in protecting and enhancing UN staff and retirees' benefits and rights in the future. FAFICS cooperation with the UN Pension Fund, the UN Pension Board, Member Nations and Member Organizations should remain effective and relevant. FAFICS did extremely well in its first 50 years and FFOA is confident that it will continue to do so in the future.





Remarks by FAFICS President Emeritus Andres Castellanos at the Annual Assembly of AFICS NY on 22 May 2025

Mr. Darshak Shah, President of AFICS NY and members of the Governing Board, Mr. Jerry Barton, President of FAFICS, distinguished guests, colleagues:

In addressing you on this special occasion, the 50th anniversary of the founding of FAFICS I am honored and privileged, bearing in mind that I am speaking remembering all other colleagues who preceded and succeeded me in my functions, whether as President of AFICS/NY and or FAFICS.

In its respect, exceptionally, allow me at this moment to pay public tribute to our colleague George Saddler, the Dean President Emeritus of FAFICS and former President of AFICS/NY and Honorary Member of its Governing Board, for his steadfast dedication of many years of his precious life, as a strong pillar of support for the welfare and wellbeing of all former UN system staff, institutionally through FAFICS and AFICS/NY, and with other Member Associations. George, you are a giant and we salute you, knowing that you are On line with us at this moment.

For fifty years, both our Organizations, FAFICS and AFICS/NY, have maintained a close cooperation on our commitment to the welfare of the entire retiree community. Since the founding of FAFICS in 1975 in Geneva, by AAFI-AFICS Geneva, FFOA Rome and AFICS/NY, a growing expanding worldwide community has emerged with the formation of other Associations dedicated to the recognition of the inherent rights and benefits of former staff of the United Nations system Organizations.

To recall a few but most importantly the first one, is the cardinal right exercised by FAFICS representatives on behalf of all retirees, beneficiaries and dependents, in the deliberations of the UN Joint Staff Pension Board, wherein all pensions issues are not only discussed, but agreed upon, and subsequently reported to the UN General Assembly through ACABQ, for approval.

This initial crucial achievement of retiree representation of FAFICS on the Pension Board, for all retirees and beneficiaries, was thanks to the steady and diligent solidarity of our towering defenders within the then Pension Board sessions years ago. Such recognition was championed by Alfred Landau leading the request and arguing for our representation, joined by Patricia Tsien and Antonio Garcia representing the UN staff on the Board with other colleagues, who supported FAFICS representation to Pension Board deliberations, on agenda items relating to policies on pensions.

Today, and for a few decades, our voices are respected by both the Pension Board and Pension Fund, as the officially recognized voice on the needs of all retirees and other beneficiaries residing in all regions, close to 90,000 spread all over the world.

By now it behooves us to recognize the extent and quality of the Pension Board's relations with FAFICS, as a true partner on a plethora of issues, achievements and concerns of common interest. FAFICS is recognized for its strong intellectual and substantive contributions and constructive approach to the complex array of issues handled by the Pension Board.

For example, it is worth reaffirming that during half a century, FAFICS has stood and stands for the welfare, rights and benefits of retirees and speaks on their behalf worldwide, as their recognized voice before the UN legislative bodies. To cite a couple of significant results: a) on the recognition of a Pension entitlement to a second surviving spouse, leading to its approval by the Board to enshrine it on the Fund Regulations, as Article 35 bis, thereby culminating years of joint efforts by AFICS/ NY and AAFI-AFICS until accepted; b) and the now accepted readjustment of requirements of the Fund Regulations for the increase of small pensions, a case in point having it being initiated by FAFICS several years ago.

FAFICS has also played a key role in supporting the operations of the Pension Fund. To cite a few examples of effective partnership: the support of FAFICS through its Member Associations to help the Fund locate members if their Certificate of Entitlement to pension payments had not been received; and/or Fund members affected by natural disasters or war.

And last but not least, the location of AFICS/NY has allowed us, on behalf of FAFICS, to participate in substantive meetings of UN bodies in New York. In accordance with FAFICS support and advocacy for United Nations Principles and Programmes, AFICS/NY has been able to deploy its many experienced members, across several fields of activity, to follow discussions at the United Nations on issues such relating to ageing, gender equality and the many other facets of social development. FAFICS support for the work of the United Nations is reported on in its Quadrennial Report to ECOSOC every four years, as required for an NGO in Consultative Status.

Let me conclude by congratulating Jerry Barton, our esteemed President of FAFICS and a dear colleague, here with us, today on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of FAFICS, which will be celebrated next July in Vienna; and recognize the sterling contribution of the FAFICS Secretary Delia Barcelona also present here. May the relationship between AFICS/NY and FAFICS continue to grow in the service of all retirees and beneficiaries.

As our journey continues with the advent of new generations of retirees, as long as the United Nations maintains an international civil service, the torch will continue being passed from generation to generation of staff members of the UN system, working for a better world for us all.

FAFICS...AT 50! by Georges Kutukdjian

Honorary Chairman, AAFU/AFUS France

Introduction

On July 26, 2025, the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS/FAAFI) will celebrate its 50th anniversary. Maturity without question! The Federation and its subsidiary bodies operate efficiently, transparently and diligently, thanks to Jerry Barton (Vienna), the President, and Delia Barcelona (Philippines), the Secretary, as well as all the members of the Bureau, who are competent, above praise and deserving of our gratitude.

It was on July 26, 1975, that four associations of former international civil servants of the United Nations system founded the Federation, namely: the Geneva Association (which brings together former UN staff and other Geneva-based organizations); our Paris Association (AFUS/AAFU); the Rome Association (which brings together former FAO staff and other Rome-based organizations); and the New York Association (UN-NY).

Today, thanks to the tireless efforts of its various Presidents and the late *Pierre Traoré* (*Burkina Faso*) – one of its former Vice-Presidents – the Federation has 64 member associations, representing over 18,000 former civil servants and their beneficiaries worldwide. The Federation is recognized by the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), and every 4 years produces a report analyzing all the activities of its member associations, which contribute to furthering the goals of the United Nations.

It's worth noting in passing that AFUS/AAFI made a major contribution to the development and functioning of the Federation. Of the 12 presidents who headed it from 1975 to the present day, 4 were former UNESCO colleagues whom I knew well: Jean Guiton (France) (1978-1982); Allan Elliott (UK) (1983-1984); George Saddler (USA) (1999-2004); and, Witold Zyss (Israel) (2005-2007). Let me also acknowledge the contributions of Warren Sachs who served as Vice President of FAFICS and member of the FAFICS delegation to the Pension Board for many years. In recent years, Josiane Taillefer (France) was one of the Vice Presidents of FAFICS for 4 years, and the undersigned Georges Kutukdjian (Lebanon-France) was Chairman of the "Standing Committee on After-service Health Insurance" (ASHI) for 9 years. What's more, over the years, AFUS/AAFI has hosted 5 annual sessions of the Council of the Federation (the sovereign body) and two meetings of its Bureau - far fewer than Geneva, New York and Vienna. It is to be hoped that the Federation will soon be able to meet again in Paris, at the invitation of our Association.

FAFICS/FAAFI achievements

At the outset of its creation, the four founding associations wished to join forces in order to speak with a single voice in presenting a concerted and coherent position on the issue of retirees' pension benefits to the bodies of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund (UNJSPF). Of course,

retirees generally took part in meetings of local pension committees convened by the various UN-system organizations, and were sometimes even appointed to sit on sessions of the relevant bodies, albeit without any formal mandate.

The UNJSPF warmly welcomed this judicious approach, and in particular the Joint (Tripartite) Pension Committee, which is the decision-making arm of the Pension Fund. As a result, for almost 30 years representatives of the pensioners' community – such as our colleagues Witold Zyss (Paris) and Gerhard Schramek (Vienna), pillars of the "Standing Committee on Pensions" set up by the Federation – have taken part in the work of the Pension Board and some of its subsidiary bodies, to the great satisfaction of the three parties that make it up: representatives of Member States; persons appointed by the Organizations; and representatives of serving staff. As proof of its gratitude, the Board awarded Witold Zyss an exceptional honorary title. In 1986, on the proposal of the Board, the General Assembly of the United Nations granted the Federation the status of representative of former officials, so that it could participate fully and formally in its work.

In the 2010s, the Associations felt the need to create a "Standing Committee on After-service Health Insurance" (ASHI) – henceforth called the "ASHI Committee" – analogous to the "Standing Committee on pensions" – henceforth called the "Pensions Committee". The reason for this was at least twofold. Firstly, since the 2000s, healthcare costs around the world had doubled or even tripled, becoming a major source of concern for retirees and their dependents. The World Health Organization (WHO) has predicted that in the coming years, healthcare costs will account for a third of the world's income. Secondly, some United Nations system organizations were wondering whether they could reduce their share of health insurance funding, for both active and retired staff.

Similar to the "Pensions Committee", the newly-created "ASHI Committee" had one meeting outside the plenary sessions, during the annual sessions of the Federation Council, to propose a mandate and a work program for the Council to implement. However, the meeting in question was an annual one, and it was up to the elected Chairman and Rapporteur to implement the program. This method was not satisfactory, because it left out the Associations and because unlike pensions, health insurance systems differ from one organization to another, and even from one duty station to another. For example, even within the UN, they differ according to whether staff members are assigned to Geneva, New York or Vienna. At the annual session in 2022, FAFICS agreed to set up a Core Group of six representatives of associations from all regions of the world, to work alongside the Chairman and Rapporteur of the ASHI Committee, so that the ASHI Committee's work program better reflects the issues faced by retirees and their dependents everywhere.

FAFICS, in response to the needs expressed by the Associations in the 2020s, set up a "Standing Membership Committee" and a "Standing Communications Committee", both of which are very active, albeit recent.

Conclusions

Since its creation, FAFICS has become the essential body representing pensioners and their beneficiaries. Their representatives, elected or appointed by the Board, are heard in the various bodies where they defend our moral and material interests. Over the 15 years that I have been involved in its work in one capacity or another, I have always admired their skills, their knowledge, their human and intellectual qualities, and their sense of moderation, avoiding any excess. It is for all these values, which command respect that they have always deserved the confidence that the Member Associations place in them.

Sincere congratulations to FAFICS on a half century of advocacy on behalf of retirees of the international civil service, five decades during

which FAFICS has grown ever wiser, as well as more relevant and influential. Over this time, FAFICS, as the sole, legitimate representative of retirees across the system, has steadfastly defended the rights of retired international civil servants, ensuring that their voices are heard. Its efforts continue apace to this day, an increase initiated by FAFICS for retirees in receipt of small pensions being a recent achievement. Anniversaries enable us to look at the record and reflect on successes, on what has been achieved, what has gone wrong and on lessons, if any. After all, the paramount objective of FAFICS is to ensure that the retirees of the future will be able to enjoy a safe and worry-free retirement protected by adequate after-service health insurance and decent pensions.

Before we look forward, a brief look back may remind us that while FAFICS has indeed enjoyed many successes, it has also had to weather storms, particularly relating to pensions. It is worth recalling a couple of examples so that we are not lulled into complacency, as the future promises to be challenging. Although it has been said that pension fund institutions were reputed, and perhaps meant to be quiet, boring places, the UN Pension Fund has given the lie to this old saw. Every decade or so, one controversial issue or another surfaces and causes noise and conflict among some of its constituents. In 2006-2007, the issue was indexation (relabeled outsourcing by today's critics) and in 2015, it was delays for those awaiting retiree benefit payments. Indexation was not introduced, thanks in part to strong objections by FAFICS. Delays, a more recent issue, were incurred by the introduction of IPAS, a new pension administrative system, and were another story. Even though retirees at the time continued to receive their pensions in a timely manner, some newly retired staff endured long waits before IPAS was able to correct the glitches in its system. The delays elicited vociferous criticism from some quarters of the Pension Fund and of FAFICS for allegedly not having done enough to right matters and redress the Fund's vaunted sins. Stakeholders who should have been natural allies and were envisioned as such when the tripartite composition of the Pension Board was established, were pitted against one another. Today, ten years later the noise

has subsided, the Pension Fund is strong and healthy and FAFICS endures as the sole legitimate representative of retirees across the system, though the trust among some stakeholders was perhaps irretrievably broken.

It is evident that current times with their turbulent global politics do not augur well for the future which may not look as rosy for staff still in service as it is for current retirees. Concerns abound. The United Nations Secretary-General, reacting to the present unstable environment has been compelled to search for solutions by calling for a budget reduction of 20 per cent and concurrent staff downsizing of 20 per cent. This would introduce premature (i.e. before the minimum retirement age) retirements and put new pressures on UN agencies, but also on the pension system. Staff obliged to retire early may need to seek further employment until they can draw an appropriate pension. At the present time, coverage for subsidized ASHI participation for those employed after July 1, 2007, requires at least 10 years of prior participation in a UN health insurance scheme. Considering that these eligibility requirements have already been in place for almost two decades and that the cost of health care will continue to rise, FAFICS needs to be thinking now about how it can protect retirees from future changes which call into question current coverage arrangements. Many international civil servants have spouses of differing nationalities and children being brought up in countries not native to either parent. Adding stress to already fraught situations, residence rights, especially in key developed country duty stations are increasingly being reduced. FAFICS needs to proactively address these and other potential problems which add to insecurity.

Despite current attempts from some quarters to weaken international organizations, they will and must endure. A world without them is simply unimaginable. FAFICS will continue to be part of the world that includes and values them. A sea change will affect UN demographics in the not-so-distant future. Retirees will outnumber serving staff. This change may occur earlier than foreseen if downsizing is implemented. For a Federation staffed almost entirely by volunteers and self-funded associations, these future demographics will increase the challenges for FAFICS.

It is now up to all of us to ensure that FAFICS remains prepared for the tasks ahead.

During the first 22 years of my participation in the Council's Meetings, I worked with seven distinguished Presidents. I might also add that I had the distinct honor to serve as Presiding Officer for one of the Council's Sessions. In light of the consistent and continued engagement of my association AFICS(AA), and my personal contribution to the growth of the Federation, the Council awarded me, on an exceptional basis, with the title of "Emeritus".

The Federation's achievements and contributions to the wellbeing of the UN retiree community has been commendable. It withstood a destructive movement which argued that with a limited number of retiree membership, the Federation could not be representative of all UN retirees. However, with the solidarity of its members, the Federation decisively contained that divisive challenge and asserted itself as a vibrant and credible service institution.

Everyone who has been part of this incredible journey must celebrate this occasion of its 50th anniversary. May this milestone inspire continued growth, innovation and success in the years to come. Here's to many years of accomplishment and service!

Tribute to Aamir Hassan Ali



Aamir Ali, who passed away in December at the age of 95, was a distinguished international civil servant, mountaineer, teacher, and writer. He was a man of many talents, known not only for his work in global governance but also for his deep

intellectual curiosity and passion for life. A dedicated public servant, he held key positions within the International Labour Organization (ILO), including Chief of Personnel and Chef de Cabinet to the Director-General. His tenure at the ILO was marked by his unwavering commitment to integrity, independence, and the highest ethical standards, qualities that defined his entire career.

Born in India, Aamir's journey took him around the world, including Japan and Geneva, where he became a highly respected figure. He was an avid mountaineer, a devoted Shakespearean, a journalist, and a mentor to many. He initiated public speaking training for young professionals, founded a Shakespeare discussion group, and edited a newsletter for retired ILO staff, ensuring that former colleagues remained engaged in the community. His enthusiasm for learning and intellectual discourse was evident throughout his life.

Jack Martin, a close colleague, described Aamir as an inspiring mentor who reshaped the way retired officials were treated. He introduced regular receptions and newsletters to foster a sense of belonging among former ILO staff. His influential 1990 study on the **International Civil Service** critically examined the gap between its ideals and reality, reinforcing the need for ethical leadership and independence in global governance. His insights remain relevant today, offering a thoughtful critique of the challenges faced by international institutions.

Even after retirement, Aamir remained deeply en

gaged in public life, writing and mentoring despite the physical limitations brought on by a severe accident. His resilience, intellectual depth, and unwavering commitment to justice left an indelible mark on those who knew him. His legacy is one of service, wisdom, and inspiration, ensuring that his contributions to international diplomacy, literature, and mentorship will not be forgotten.

Aamir Ali, who passed away in December 2018, was a distinguished international civil servant, a dynamic leader, and a passionate intellectual. He served as Chairman of AAFI/AFICS for many years, leaving a lasting impact on the organization. A man of many talents, Aamir's life spanned continents and disciplines—from mountaineering in the Himalayas and Alps to shaping international policies at the ILO and UNHCR.

Educated in India, Aamir's love for English and literature was instilled by his mother. He initially pursued teaching before shifting to journalism and eventually joining the ILO in 1946. His career in international service was marked by versatility and dedication, holding key roles in social security, personnel, and training. He even served as Chef de Cabinet to the ILO Director-General. Despite his seniority, he remained humble, mentoring new colleagues and fostering an inclusive, collegial work environment.

Aamir's post-retirement years were equally active. He founded a Shakespeare discussion group and launched a newsletter for retired ILO officials, publishing 60 issues over 30 years. His 2018 book, *There Comes a Time*, reflected his optimism and deep intellect. A firm believer in the principles of international civil service, he advocated for its integrity and independence.

Aamir's legacy is one of intellect, service, and human connection. Whether in policy, literature, or friendship, he left an indelible mark, always hopeful that "the roses will bloom again."

Tribute to Roger Eggleston



In Memoriam Roger Eggleston: FAFICS Past President (2012-2014)

Roger Eggleston passed away at his home in Warwick, England on March 22nd, 2024. He was President of FAFICS from 2012 – 2014, when he became ill suddenly shortly before the Council in Rome and could not continue.

Tribute from Jerry Barton, FAFICS President

"I was not in contact with Roger during the last decade, but I worked closely with him from 1999 to 2002 when we were both Executive Secretaries to parts of the UN's Chief Executives Board (although in 1999 it was still the Administrative Committee on Coordination. Our offices were literally just across the hall from each other. Roger was my mentor, and I learned much that has proved valuable in my professional life and personally. Roger's knowledge of the wider UN system and his ability to see what needed to be done and to do it were remarkable. When we supported official meetings, I learned from Roger to pay attention during the meetings, use the following hospitality time for networking, and then regardless of how late the evening had become – to write the minutes needed for the following morning's session. To my mind, Roger was the ultimate international civil servant. He believed in the goals of the UN and lived them. He had the ability to find the proper people to move issues forward. His unique skill was to identify the actions needed and to do them with his team in a pleasant and supporting manner. He made tasks enjoyable. It did not hurt that he often sang opera in the hallway and wore improbable ties (and sometimes improbable socks as well).

Roger also conducted a choir. He loved music and listened to opera in his office and often sang along (and sang well). After retiring, Roger was President of our Member Association AAFI-AFICS Geneva and a Vice-president of FAFICS before becoming President of FAFICS. He was sincerely interested in retiree issues. As a Vice-president he worked actively with a FAFICS team to propose reforms to the Pension Fund. I remember when he accepted the FAFICS Presidency, he mentioned three main interests, which I am still working on today. The first was to continue expanding membership. The second was communications and connection with the Member Associations for which he founded FAFICS MATTERS, an excellent and first of its kind bulletin of which he was the editor but that ceased after his presidency ended. The third was working on topics to further UN goals, specifically ageing, from the many UN programmes. Well, Roger, we are still working on your goals. Thank you for having the insight and setting directions, even if it has taken us a while. Be at peace, friend. You did what had to be done and were a good and

fair person with a sharp mind. You will be missed, but your ideas and help will continue."

Tribute from Andrés Castellanos, the President of FAFICS preceding Roger

"We had not spoken in over a year more or less, and not long ago I had in mind to call him to have a good chat and find out how they were. He was one of our FAFICS solid columns in AAFI-AFICS, and who during my period I could rely on and trust as if looking in a mirror. As I was concluding my tenure, I urged Roger to accept being the candidate to succeed me, but he declined repeatedly due to family issues. After many consultations, he agreed to be nominated. It was a pleasure for me to see him as the new President of FAFICS. I knew FAFICS would go further with him at the helm. Roger and I, with Linda Saputelli as President of AFICS-NY met with Secretary-General Ban KI-Moon. Roger was delighted as I was at the SG's acceptance. Had he remained longer as President, only shortened because of health, his period would have been one of our greatest presidencies.

May he rest in the glory of the Lord. I join you all with much grief."

Tribute from Linda Saputelli, President following Roger

"Roger and I were more or less contemporaries in our UN careers over many years. Since our respective functions required us to work together and interact frequently (often as professional adversaries) I saw close up how Roger developed into the leader he became. And although it could have been easy at times to dismiss his rather exuberant demeanor, it would have been our loss as it masked his fundamental gravitas. I talked regularly with Roger during my tenure as FAFICS President and in the years that followed. He was always happy to have news about FAFICS but seemed to have adapted well to his new life in England. After his long years as a UN expatriate in Geneva, it was hard to imagine him anywhere else, but he wanted to be nearer to his adult children and grandchild and he became close to his late daughter-in-law of whom he was very fond and who was a frequent bridge partner. There are many things one can say about Roger and others have already covered them well. For me, I remember how he recognized and valued networking at which he was particularly adept, and which inspired me when I was FAFICS President to rebuild our networking channels and resume a more active FAFICS participation in the meetings of the Pension Board's Participants' Representatives. I will miss my chats with him."

International Civil Servant Extraordinaire...

George F. Saddler @98



When I arrived at the Five Star Premier Residences, a retirement community facility in Yonkers New York, George was queued up along with other senior residents of the building, for his 4th Covid-19 vaccine booster shot. Right after that, he motioned to his aide, Patricia, to lead us to the dining hall room where we were served a sit-down meal, with options from a printed menu, prepared daily by the dining crew led by the residence's excellent chef. George ordered Chicken Tenders and Pasta Fagioli soup. He also asked for hot sauce — a constant additive to his food. When I asked him if he observed any diet, he said, "no, I eat anything. The only thing that I don't eat are the table legs!" Obviously, he has not lost his sense of humor.

George Saddler turned 98 years old on September 27, 2023.

He is known to many UN retirees as the 2nd President of the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS) which he served with conviction, excellence and committed leadership from 1999-2004. He recalled some of the retirees that he dealt with closely at that time, among them, FAFICS first President that he succeeded, Aamir Ali, and the one that followed his term as President, Witold Zyzz who was FAFICS 3rd President. Both Presidents Ali and Zyzz have passed away.

On the origins of FAFICS, George said, "perhaps I am the only one remaining from those days when FAFICS was initially organized with the five original members: GENEVA, NEW YORK, ROME, PARIS AND LONDON." He was pleased to know that FAFICS has now grown, some 2 decades later, to 64 member Associations.

He added, "I believe that I am the only person still around who was at the original meeting with the Secretary General U Thant when he authorized the creation of AFICS NY when he stated that AFICS NY would be financed within the resources of the UN Regular Budget." He mentioned another retiree, Molly Bruce, apparently the one who wrote the Document on the origins of AFICS NY.

"The first association for UN retirees, to my recollection was created in the ILO because the ILO which was the International Organization that dealt with the workers. It's normal and appropriate for the ILO to be the International Organization that created the first AFICS. In fact, the first UN Pension Scheme was also created in ILO." While talking about ILO, he also remembered a friend and former UNESCO colleague Charles Lamuniere whose mother was

known to be one of the last surviving persons who continued to receive her pension from the original ILO pension scheme because all of ILO staff were given the option of transferring their pension entitlement into the UN Pension Fund and they did when it was created.

"The ILO created AAFI/AFICS in Geneva that became the first Retiree Association in the UN System because in New York there were obviously no UN retirees and initially the retirees when there were a few were considered within the umbrella of the NY UN Staff Association. This arrangement continued until the number of retirees grew and the NY UN staff association was not concerned with the same group of issues as the retirees, i.e., pension and insurance, as opposed to salaries, working conditions, home leave, etc. Thus, there was a division between the two groups, UN Staff and UN Pensioners that remains even today, to me at least, it appears that there is a gulf between the two UN groups even though all staff who become eligible will someday retire and thus they should, in my view have a concern for their future status. But they don't appear to be that concerned about this issue.

His advice to the UNJSPF and all UN System agencies, they must ensure that those agencies have competent people to handle retiree pension benefits.

His experience with FAFICS was made more significant by the fact that he was also President of AFICS New York at the same time. He said there was a lot of work involved but, it turned out good for him, in a way, because his supportive and loving wife had died shortly before he became President of AFICS NY. "My grieving was not as severe as it could have been because of the work involvement with FAFICS and AFICS/NY".

His introduction to FAFICS did not come overnight, it was based on his long career with both the public and the private sector that made him best suited for the job. After retiring from the US foreign service, and UNESCO, he was asked by several AFICS/NY friends and former UN colleagues to join AFICS/NY and shortly after, he was appointed the Secretary by its then President, Freddie Freidgut. Then he was elected President where he met Aamir Ali, the FAFICS President during a FAFICS session in New York. When Aamir Ali stepped down, he was asked to be a candidate as his successor to the FAFICS Presidency, for which he was acclaimed without any competition or opposition.

During his time as FAFICS President, he recalled several issues that were major concerns at that time. One issue, which persists today, was the case of the former Soviet UN staff members whose pension entitlements were very difficult to resolve. This was due to the entrenched Soviet Government position that Soviet staff members who became UN staff members, would not receive a UN pension at the conclusion of their UN service and would instead receive a Soviet pension. Additionally, he recalls some challenges then in the relations with several South American AFICS that had been newly admitted to FAFICS.

He remembered a personal circumstance that stood out when he was the President of FAFICS. He had a major colon surgery in New York, but he did not let that surgery interfere with his functions as the President of FAFICS. He still traveled to Geneva with a colostomy on his side; and was closely monitored by his doctor in NY who made contacts with a doctor and hospital in Geneva to treat him if a problem developed. Fortunately, he survived the surgery and managed to successfully conduct the scheduled FAFICS session.

His work as President also involved dealing with the UN Pension Board. He had good relations with the UNJSPF CEO and Secretary as well as the Secretariat of the Pension Fund, ow-

ing largely to his long association with some of the staff before he joined FAFICS. When he was Minister Counselor for Resource Management at the US Mission to the UN, he had the primary responsibility in New York for US participation in the Pension Fund and Board.

Also, as a former member of the UN ACABQ, he had access in several capacities and in several ways to influence the actions and decisions of the UN Pension Board, all of which he feels were done for the benefit and best interest of FAFICS and all UN System retirees. Also, in UNESCO, as the Assistant Director General for Administra-



tion, he was responsible for the UNESCO participation in the Pension Board and Fund. This experience gave him access to information about the governments, the heads of UN agencies and the retirees' views and their positions on various UN pension issues. In his words, "I believe that this experience and knowledge aided and benefited all UN system pensioners".

Overall, he found all aspects of his being President of FAFICS very rewarding. "Just being of service to the UN system retirees was the only reward I could imagine. I was very grateful to be able and competent enough to provide the "pro bono" services to FAFICS". He added that he truly appreciated and enjoyed the contacts with other UN Retirees and Associations on top of the opportunity to pay back for all the rewarding benefits he has had being in the UN system secretariat.

Mindful of his condition, at this point I asked if he was tired and if we should stop the interview. He quickly replied, "I am not tired", hence I continued. Mr. Saddler has an amazing memory for details – mentioning names of people in the early days of FAFICS, with clarity and fond memories from at least two decades ago such as colleagues Freddie Freidgut who was earlier mentioned, and Patricia Tsien and Molly Bruce, all AFICS/ NY officers.

George Saddler was born in Memphis, Tennessee on 27 September 1925. As the proud son of a single Mother who was schoolteacher, he believed that teaching is the most honest profession in the world. He described his mother as strong very loving and willed and remembered that in 1941, with only \$200 sewn to his underwear, his mother decided to send him from Memphis to New York City with the prospect of his going to college, which seemed to have laid out his eventual career path with the UN.

But he also knows that one should start from the bottom. Before he joined the US Army at the young age of 18 in 1943, he has had various odd jobs, the first one being as an office boy at a Shoe Company New York City. In the US Army, he fondly recalls being deployed to the island of Leyte, in the Philippines, where then General Douglas Mc Arthur said his famous words, "I shall return" while serving as the US Army field marshal to the Philippine Army.

As a professional, George has had practically every experience in the world. Graduating with an Accounting Degree from NYU, he has worked as an Accountant, Budget and Finance Officer, Assistant to the UN Comptroller, Adviser, and Consultant on such matters with the



private sector, the US Government, and the United Nations. But one of the most significant positions he recalled were those of his role as Supervisor of the Accounting Department of a large mid-Western Corporation, the Chief Accountant and Assistant to the City Controller for the city of Chicago, and as a senior US Foreign Service Officer.

In one of these capacities with the US Government and having been a Senior Officer at the US Mission to the United Nations, he landed a job in the UN as Deputy Director of the UN Budget Office, and as Assistant to the UN Controller, subsequently as Director of Finance at

UNDP, and eventually as, Assistant Director General for Administration of UNESCO in its HQ in Paris, France.

Having retired at age 60, he spent some 4 decades of his time serving in these various capacities and always leaving a fine legacy of competent service, management, and leadership.

On a more personal note, he started to talk about his family. He stated that he comes from a large middle-class family and enjoyed a happy contented life in his hometown Memphis, Tennessee. He describes his background as multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, multi-linguistic, and multi-religious in a neighborhood where all the children got along and played together harmoniously. He was part of a large family with a great grandmother, at least 4 grandparents, several aunts, uncles, cousins, brothers, and sisters, plus many playmates.

As a person, he describes himself as easy to deal with, he "likes what he likes and says what he likes". He was quite athletic in his younger years, playing basketball, football, and baseball. He was also on a college football team, and active in several organizations that he worked with when he joined the army. He says he learned something important from playing football which he considered very important later when he moved into the working world. "You can have all the talent in the world, but you must have a team! You should always seek to have a team." He proudly says his single Mother raised him simply as a human being, recalling his childhood to be simple, pleasant, and being raised without regard to race or skin color. As kids, "we just played together". Later in life, he realized that his mother used him as an experiment on how to raise a child.

"I met the girl I later married in high school. She was 13 and I was 14. We later married when I was 18 and she was 17. I had registered for the World War II draft at 18 and was drafted shortly thereafter and sent to Fort Benning, Georgia, then to Fort Dix, New Jersey, and then to Camp Crowder, Missouri, all for specialized training in communications. I went overseas to the Pacific Theater of war and for a period, I was attached to General McArthur's staff at the lowly rank of cable splicer in the Philippines to maintain communications







between Manila Hotel and his other location. After being discharged from the US Army, my wife and I moved to New York City where I attended New York University, graduating in June 1950 with my degree in Accounting". His marriage to Pauline blessed them with two daughters, Paula, and Paulette and one granddaughter, Rebecca.

Still going strong in his twilight years, he seems to maintain a daily routine that defies aging and any health challenges he may have. At 98, George still uses the computer, sends, and receives emails – just uses all caps for readability. Two private duty health care Aides take turns assisting him daily in this nice senior assisted living facility, Five Star Premier Residences in Yonkers, New York, a place adequately furnished and decorated with photos and memorabilia of his family and oil paintings by his late wife, Pauline.

His day starts around 8 am. and by 10 a.m., he is on his computer to check emails and to keep in touch with friends around the world. He then eats lunch at his apartment, then attends personal affairs like paying bills and all; and by 6 pm., he goes downstairs to his senior living facility to join some happy hour. Dinner is usually between 7 and 8 p.m., after which he goes back to his apartment to watch TV, or western movies, until about 1 a.m. when he almost always just naturally slips into sleep. He wears a life alert pendant, just to be on the safe side, in case of emergency.



About socializing with others in his building, Mr. Saddler says, he doesn't do it every day because sometimes he doesn't have much in common with the other senior residents of the building who are mostly locals. As a former International Civil Servant, he doesn't always have much in common topics to share or discuss with other residents. It was in this context that he said "the UNJPF should consider building a retirement facility for UN retirees."

When asked about his secret to healthy longevity, he said, "although I have dealt with people since I was 8 years old when I began selling pulp magazines to the neighbors where I lived, I am fortunate to have been able to avoid stressful situations in my long personal or working situations plus, I guess, I simple have good genes from my father and mother. I was always alert with a very good memory, as a student I always scored high marks on tests because I could recall exactly what and when the teacher said something or what I had read in a book. I have a glass of wine, red or white, with my dinner each night."

On the same point about having an incredible mind, he remembered that in 1944, when he was 18 years old and drafted in the US Army, he scored so high on the test given to new recruits that the recruitment personal gave him the same test a second time to validate the results of the first test, and he scored even higher on the second test because he remembered all the answers from the first test! They classified him as a genius and offered him a position at the Officer Candidates School, but he refused because he didn't want to have a military career in the future. Well, I guess, the UN is happy because you joined the secretariat and we had you in FAFICS.

He had no advice for his younger self as he said, "I've had a contented and pleasant younger life without any calamities or bad occurrences except the deaths of some close relatives that I missed very much. My mother taught me that while I was no better than any other individual, I was no worse than any other individual, that I was simply a human being who should respect all other individual human beings and groups as human beings, but of course, it is normal that one should like some individual human beings better than others".

His advice to anyone involved with FAFICS in any capacity "to put the best interest and welfare of the UN System retirees before their individual concerns, desires, and interests. Don't become involved in FAFICS because of the possibility of traveling to its meeting, which unfortunately is what some AFICS participants see as the main benefit of getting involved in FAFICS. In addition, do your homework and come to FAFICS sessions well prepared to have open and unbiased discussions of important issues facing the UN System retirees, be it health insurance, pensions, safety, or welfare".

As a final message to UN retirees around the world, Mr. George F Saddler had this to say. "It is an honor and privilege to work or to have worked in the UN System, and we should all feel blessed to have the experience of being an International Civil Servant. In my opinion, if FAFICS did not exist, it would certainly have to be created because its importance is beyond question. Even colleges and schools have alumni associations to maintain and protect the honor and traditions of the college or school. Therefore, AFICS and by extension FAFICS are important to maintain the honor and traditions of the International Civil Service. FAFICS is extremely relevant to the UN System retirees."

Robert Kaminker. the last of the Mohicans (Excerpt from the AFICS New York bulletin)

Robert Kaminker, the oldest French civil servant of the United Nations, died on 3 January 2025, in Dordogne, where he had retired after a professional life devoted entirely to the service of the Organization.

He humorously described himself as "the last of the Mohicans".

As a teenager, he was forced with his family to take refuge in Agonac, a village in Périgord, to escape Nazi persecution. He had joined his uncle and father, who were resistance fighters.

Born in 1927, Robert Kaminker began his career on 10 January 1946 during the first UN General Assembly in London.

He was among the first witnesses of the installation of the Organization in New York and then held administrative positions on four continents for 36 years.



A discreet, generous man, open to his time, Robert Kaminker, once retired, never stopped being an advocate for the Organization, particularly with the younger generations. In particular, he spoke at schools about his career and, through it, to convey his faith in the unique capacity of the Organization to promote peace in the world.

At 90, he was still hosting a weekly radio show in his native southwestern France, called L'ONU vous concerne, or "The UN Matters".

In 2017, Mr. Kaminker gave an podcast interview for The Lid Is On.

Lydia Ontal, longtime Assistant Secretary of FAFICS, shares memories of the UN and FAFICS

I began my UN career at the Visitors Section in the DPI Guided Tours Unit. As a General Service Staff with a relatively short period of service, there was really nothing significant about my experience. The only memorable experience that comes to mind was the 50th Anniversary of the United Nations in 1995, when I was one of the DPI staff members assigned to escort the Heads of States to their assigned spots at the commemorative photo session in the Trusteeship Council Chamber. I escorted Mr. Fidel Castro to his assigned spot on my row. Seeing him in person, together with other controversial figures like Chairman Yasser Arafat and many other famous faces that I only saw on television and newspapers, was very fascinating to me. Not long after my assignment at the Visitors Section, I became Secretary to Mr. John Wong upon his promotion as Chief of Publications Service in the Department of Public Information. One day, Mr. George Saddler, President of AFICS/NY, who was a friend of Mr. Wong dropped by the office to visit and he told Mr. Wong that he was looking for a Secretary/Office Assistant.



Three months after my retirement, I found myself in the AFICS office as Secretary/Office Assistant. The office had just moved from its tiny office space in DC2 which only had five desks and chairs, two-word processors and a type-writer. Mr. Saddler took his friend Mr. Benon Sevan, then Assistant Secretary General for General Services to see for himself the sad situation of the AFICS office. Mr. Saddler and Mr. Sevan knew each other when they were working in the Budget Office. Through Mr. Sevan's intervention, AFICS/NY was given the coveted space in DC1 where we are now. We were furnished with new PCs, a fax machine, a heavy-duty copier and a space large enough to have a conference room for Governing Board meetings.

When Mr. Saddler was elected President of FAFICS, the FAFICS Secretary, Mr. Anders Tholle, had asked for an assistant because he was based in Geneva where the FAFICS Secretariat is located and the President was based in New York. The position of Assistant Secretary was created at the next Council Session and I was elected to that position which I held for several years until it was abolished years later. However, I continued to be actively in-

volved with FAFICS as the representative of AFICS Philippines. I had organized AFICS Philippines together with a retiree from UNDP Manila during the incumbency of Mr. Andrés Castellanos, who was focused on increasing membership to FAFICS. AFICS Philippines was accredited to the Federation in 2009 and has since increased its membership to almost 200 active members. I represent them as a member of the Executive Board as Vice President for International Relations.

Except for the Council Session that was held in Nairobi, I have attended all Council Sessions held in Geneva, Vienna, Paris, London, Rome, Montreal and New York during the incumbency of six FAFICS Presidents.

Working directly under AFICS/NY Presidents Mr. George Saddler, Mr. O. Richard Nottidge, Mr. Edward Omotoso and Mr. Andrés Castellanos as AFICS/NY Secretary and as FAFICS Assistant Secretary, has given me the opportunity to meet thousands of UN retirees and representatives of the 63 Member Associations (then) of FAFICS and interact with them at the annual Council Sessions. It has broadened my perspective of how the UN system and its agencies work, the active participation of FAFICS in the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund, and the After-Service Health Insurance Scheme in protecting the interests of United Nations retirees and beneficiaries, especially on matters relating to pensions and health insurance.

To me personally, it has been a privilege to be part of a team that in many ways, great and small, helped in transforming FAFICS into what it is today. I have learned to appreciate and respect the diversity of people around the world and its different cultures and I have been fortunate to work with many talented and dedicated retirees with unquestionable commitment to the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants.

FAFICS – Playing Sherlock Holmes at AFICS-Netherlands: Tracing beneficiaries for UNJSPF

It all started Thursday the 4th of April 2024 - a confidential mail from UNJSPF which reached us at AFICS-Netherlands through FAFICS: Five persons in the Netherlands on the list **Beneficiaries Stated for Benefit Suspension Due to Non-Receipt by the Fund of their Certificates of Entitlement (CE)**. In bold and with capitals! Urgent!

A quick check in our member-data base showed that no AFICS-NL members were affected. Relief! But a second look at the list showed four persons born before 1950, three older than 80 years. What impact could benefit suspension have on them? The confidential UNJSPF list showed only one person with a phone number and emergency contact details. Two persons had not even listed an email address. The search began!

9th of April: the first phone call - phone out of service! - luckily there was an emergency number. Our call was received with (understandable) suspicion by the beneficiary's son. A hesitant talk followed ending with "Please, inform your mother. She is welcome to call us". A few days later, we got a constructive contact with the friendly beneficiary widow who was encouraged to work on her digital CE. The first candidate slated for suspension was off the list! On to the rest.

Mid-April: sending emails and letters by mail to the remaining four. One happened to live a 10-minute bike ride away from the secretary of AFICS-NL - home delivery! After assuring that I wasn't a Jehova's witness at the door (!), we had a nice coffee and chat. "Thanks for informing me, I never open UNJSPF letters", said the beneficiary, while showing a drawer full of unopened envelopes. Second person off the list.

2nd of May: a grateful first response to the emails: the happy beneficiary also decided to become an AFICS member.

On 16th of May, one day before the deadline, while hiking in France, a panicky call from number 4 came in: "Please, inform UNJSPF that I have submitted my papers." - Fourth person off the list.

Only one beneficiary remaining: e-mails and letter yielded no response. Calling and writing to the municipality for help resulted in a reference to the European law of General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) - protecting privacy of people. Unfortunately, information could not be shared.

So, an 80% success rate. We are happy with the result, but it still hurts a little we couldn't reach the last person, who, although not a member of AFICS-NL, remains part of our UN family.

How the retirees Association in Brazil was born

In 1987, a senior UNDP official, an Argentinean who had recently retired from his duties in Brazil and was living in Rio de Janeiro, decided to maintain his residence here.

Already aware of the existence of FAFICS, he proposed to create the Association of Former International Civil Servants in Brazil – AAFIB. FAFICS was the inspiration for its creation. Despite the "International" in the name, it was clear that it was intended for former United Nations employees, regardless of their local or international status. This official was Eduardo Albertal, director of the UNDP in several countries and who had worked in other United Nations agencies.

The creation of AAFIB had the decisive support of UNIC-Rio, the United Nations Information Center in Brazil, which operated in the Itamaraty Palace, the former headquarters of Brazil's Foreign Affairs Office, in Rio de Janeiro. UNIC provided all the necessary infrastructure, such as a secretariat, communication, meeting rooms and a formal address for the establishment of the new Association.

In fact, the Federation gave status and identity to the Brazilian Association, which was quite informal and brought together, for the most part, retirees from PANAFTOSA/WHO/PAHO. At the time, they felt that they had no concrete support to understand the requirements of the Pension Fund and health plans. And Eduardo Albertal, the founder and president, with a few colleagues and assistants, dedicated himself as a missionary and personally to serving these retirees. The contributions were paid to anyone on the board, usually to Albertal himself. When he had to attend the FAFICS Sessions, of which he was vice-president at the time, he would "pass the hat" among the members and collect some money to make up for what he paid out of his own pocket. Albertal was director of the UNDP in several countries and of other United Nations agencies.

Unfortunately, we have no living or documentary records of that time. But anyway, we can say that AAFIB is the legitimate daughter of FAFICS!

Overcoming COVID

In March 2020, we started our term with great enthusiasm and many projects. However, the COVID-19 pandemic drastically changed the situation. Bolivia declared a nationwide lockdown with movement restrictions, complicating the board's work. Meetings were conducted via group phone calls, since board members were not familiar with Zoom or Meet. We organized delivery of certificates of Entitlement through an authorized courier to the members' homes.

With no regular flights or diplomatic pouch, we managed to send through relatives of members who were traveling to the US on the first available flights. As the treasurer was unable to access bank funds, the president covered the shipping cost. We created a WhatsApp group to share health protocols and coordinate support with a significant effort by the president and the secretary to ensure that most members joined. We facilitated medical support for members affected by COVID-19 and worked closely with UN doctors and health insurance providers to ensure timely assistance with the support of the newly arrived Resident Coordinator.

Unfortunately, the board suffered irreparable losses: Vice President Bertha Gutiérrez and Treasurer José Bueno fell seriously ill and passed away, leaving financial operations inactive. By the end of the pandemic, several board members stepped down leaving the president as the sole board member managing the Certificates of Entitlement, participating in FAFIC meetings, and reconstructing the financial records of membership contributions over the past four years.

The 2020-2023 term was extremely challenging. The health crisis made operations difficult, but with dedication and effort, we ensured AFICS Bolivia continued to function and support its members during the most critical moments. As president, I faced unexpected challenges but also found a unique opportunity to serve and strengthen our community. Despite the difficulties, we made significant progress and laid a solid foundation for the future of the association.

How ARPUPU has supported retirees

The UPU has its own Providence Scheme with rules similar (but not identical) to those of the UNJSPF, and ARPUPU represents retirees within it. The last few decades have seen a deterioration in the Scheme's financial situation, and consequently pensions have not been adjusted to the cost of living for many years. In 2024, ARPUPU cooperated on a compromise solution allowing indexation to resume from 2026.

The health insurance solution for UPU retirees is also unique. While insurance benefits are comparatively favourable, the cost-based premium system is highly discriminatory, with retirees paying premiums up to double those paid by staff in active service. After internal appeals in 2023, 35 retirees – under ARPUPU guidance - filed a complaint with UNAT in the spring of 2024. The Tribunal has yet to give its verdict.

Supporting UN Retirees in India: A Lifeline Beyond Service

Through these efforts, UNPAI, New Delhi, has reaffirmed its role as more than just an administrative facilitator—it is a compassionate community that ensures UN retirees in India continue to lead dignified, secure, and fulfilling lives.

As FAFICS celebrates its 50th anniversary, UNPAI, New Delhi, proudly reaffirms its commitment to advocating for and supporting UN retirees, ensuring their post-service years remain secure and enriched within a global community that truly cares.


We extend our deepest condolences to their families and loved ones. May their example continue to inspire us all, and may they rest in peace, knowing their work lives on in the Federation they helped shape.
